Survey on AIAA, ARA, ATA. The CAA and MoD are currently reviewing the utility of having AIAA (area of intense aerial activity), ARA (advisory radar area), and ATA (aerial tactics area) marked on maps and charts. To that end, they would like to know what the GA community thinks of the concepts and have asked FASVIG (Future Airspace Strategy VFR Implementation Group) to survey the UK GA community. Specifically, to what extent are you aware of AIAA (area of intense aerial activity), ARA (advisory radar area) and ATA (aerial tactics area) and do you operate differently when flying within them? The short (less than 2 minutes) survey is open until 20th March 2016 and can be accessed at http://kwiksurveys.com/s/lvYv7RNL. Regulatory

Air Displays. Following the tragic incident at Shoreham, the CAA took a number of immediate steps, including identifying enhanced risk assessment criteria for all future air displays. Although the final report is not yet available, an action report has been produced describing a number of enhancements that the CAA, air show organisers, and others should carry out before the start of the 2016 air display season. New Records. Two British National Open Class records have been set with flights from New Tempe, South Africa. Ed Downham claimed a new 1000km triangle speed record on 30th November with an average speed of 146.84 km/h in a JS1c (21m) to beat Pam Hawkins' 1998 record. On 18th December, Phil Jeffery beat the 750km triangle speed record that he set last winter with an average speed of 170.91 km/h in a Ventus 2cxt-18m.

Wenlock Olympian Games. Four years ago Midland Gliding Club hosted the first Wenlock Olympian Gliding Games at the Longmynd in partnership with the Wenlock Olympian Society, to coincide with the hosting of the London 2012 Olympic Games. As the event was such a success it is being repeated this year from 9th-16th July. The event is a single class handicapped competition open to all wooden or fabric covered gliders. Tasks are designed to give all a fighting chance and launching is by winch, aerotow or even bungee on suitable days. In 2012

there were entries from seven different European countries and more than 40 individual gliders; this time entries are limited to 40 gliders. Juniors

Bursaries. A number of bursaries will shortly be closing for applications. Applications for Royal Aero Club Trust bursaries (up to £1000 available for post-solo pilots aged 14-21) must be received by the BGA by 17th March. Honourable Company of Air Pilot bursaries, which offer those over 16 a one-week residential pre-solo gliding course, need to be applied for by 8th March and applications for Air League Gliding Scholarships, offering help to post-solo pilots aged 16-25 close on 19th February. General

Keep Airfields Greenfields Petition. Last autumn, we highlighted how a 2003 'administrative oversight' coupled with a proposal in last year's summer budget statement would automatically allow planning permission to be granted for housing developments on designated brownfield sites. The 2003 oversight removed the clause that previously protected airfields from being classed as brownfield. This unintended consequence of wider policy on the development of redundant industrial sites has been described by Pilot magazine as "the darkest news to face General Aviation for some time" and there is already one gliding club under threat from proposed housing and industrial developments; there may be others in the future. We asked that you sign an online petition that had been set up to demand a review of the brownfield designation of airfields. So far, the petition has over 19,000 signatures and requires a further 81,000 to get the issue considered for debate in Parliament. RAeC Awards. The gliding community has once again featured strongly in the list of recipients of Royal Aero Club awards for 2015. Included in the list of winners is the British Junior Gliding Team which receives the Prince of Wales Cup for the most meritorious performance, feat or event by either a team or a group during the preceding year. Russell Cheetham and Julian Scarfe are awarded RAeC Silver Medals. Russell's award is for his consistently outstanding international performance and dedication to competitive gliding through both his flying and his years of work on the BGA Competitions Committee; Julian, although not a glider pilot, was nominated for the award by the BGA for the leading representational role that he has undertaken on a voluntary basis for non-commercial General Aviation (GA) and for sporting and recreational aviation in general. Bob Pettifer receives a RAeC Certificate of Merit for his lifetime involvement in gliding during which he has been club Chairman and CFI, Chairman of the BGA Instructors' Committee and a BGA regional FIE as well as organising air experience flying days over a 20 year period for people from the Southport Spinal Injuries Unit as part of their rehabilitation. Last, but by no means least, S&G editor Susan Newby wins the Nexus Aviation Journalist of the Year Award. The winners will be presented with their awards by HRH the Duke of York at the RAeC Annual Awards ceremony on 18th May 2016 at the RAF Club.
