LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Flying seems able to get under a person's skin in a way that few other things can. It is perhaps for this reason that many of those involved in air sports are quite likely to be described as 'passionate' or 'obsessed' about what they do. It is also an environment that tends to attract a very wide cross-section of society and the professions. In any field, such a combination of commitment and expertise creates a highly potent set of capabilities that can be called on in a variety of ways. The ability of air sports to draw on a very broad base of highly skilled volunteers, quite prepared to devote significant time to helping at all levels, has been – and remains – vital to maintaining both the attractiveness and viability of sporting and recreational aviation in the UK. We owe a lot to all those that give generously of their time to help the rest of us.

Dr. Peter Saundby is one person that is worthy of particular appreciation – and has just been made a Companion of the Royal Aero Club in recognition of all that he has done



over a great many years. Peter's interest in gliding got him into air sports in the first place; his extensive experience and deep skills as a medical professional have enabled him to provide aviation medical advice to countless pilots from across air sport disciplines; and his ability to understand and communicate the role that medical risk factors do and do not play in sporting and recreational aviation has been key to arguing the 'corner' for appropriate medical standards for sporting pilots at both

national and European levels. That Peter has been doing all these things for many decades clearly shows that he has made helping all of us his life's work – something quite remarkable when one realises just how busy he has been in other respects.

During the course of his professional (as opposed to air sport volunteer) career, Peter held dual qualifications in the RAF as both a medical doctor and pilot – a 'day job' took him all over the world. As an aside, that he became interested in aviation ought not be a surprise – and might even be described as an inherited condition. His father, Air Marshal Sir Robert Saundby, became a military aviator with the Royal Flying Corps in 1916 – and was probably one of those that received their training from the Royal Aero Club – before a long and distinguished career in the RAF.

I'd also like to take this opportunity to single out one other long-term volunteer/stalwart of the air sport community in order to say a special 'thank you'. Diana King has been instrumental in the hugely important area of air sports development – in particular, airfield and environmental safeguarding, club management and development, and the liaison with external sporting representative bodies and regulators. I am conscious of the fact that the list of Diana's actual activities would need several more entries were it to be anywhere close to complete. The editor of the RAeC Newsletter, however, tends to impose strict word limits on my copy and so is likely to cut things out were I to try and do it full justice. Having said that, I should point out that Diana has also been the editor of the RAeC newsletter for some time – though she has now decided to make another attempt to 'escape' and has asked that we begin the search for her successor. Whilst Dave Phipps and I begin the search for a new editor – something that should not take us more than three or four years to complete – we'd like to express our gratitude to Diana for everything that she has done for the Club over the years.

We can never have too many people like Peter or Diana working on our behalves. We are faced with a wide range of issues that demand careful, often highly technical scrutiny; the development of intricate responses; and constant engagement with others. These take an enormous amount of mostly volunteer time and energy. Every indication is that we will need to expend increasing amounts of time in the future.

The recent Europe Air Sports annual conference gave us an insight into the sorts of challenge that we will have to pay more attention to, including areas that have never previously been the subject of the attention of aviation regulators. The slow development of the commercial UAV sector has been rapidly accelerated by the take-up of drones that appeal to both commercial and recreational users. As a consequence, model flying is now being drawn into the heart of the debate about the planned regulations that will be applied to all drones.



Dave Phipps, RAeC Secretary and BMFA CEO, is part of the leadership team of the recently formed European Model Flying Union. Expect to hear more from Dave over the coming months, as this relatively new line of air sport activity develops a head of steam.

Much of what I have written about has concerned the volunteers that work tirelessly across air sports. The RAeC will be acknowledging the work of many of them, and the sporting achievements of others involved in sporting and recreational aviation at its annual Awards ceremony in May. I look forward to highlighting some of those in the next newsletter.

In the meantime, happy aviating.

Andrew Davis, a former double World Gliding Champion, took home the Open Class bronze. In the hotly contested 18 Metre Class, Mike Young won the bronze medal. The success of the whole team resulted in the award of the Team Gold medal to Great Britain. Congratulations to all.

Their mission was to fly over every camp Rusty was based at whilst flying with 101 (Special Duties) Squadron. The highlight of the trip was the return to Ludford Magna, the first time Rusty had seen it from the air since the night before D-Day when he was bringing back a Lancaster bomber.

Rusty is the oldest holder of an FAI sporting licence in the world.

FAI

The FAI has announced a new strategic partnership with US asset management firm Noosphere Ventures.

FAI President Frits Brink and Secretary General Susanne Schödel signed the agreement, which names Noosphere as an FAI Global Technical Partner, in Dnipro, Ukraine, on 2 February 2017.

The first stage of the partnership will involve Noosphere developing a cutting edge competition and event management system to be used at the IWGA World Games in Wroclaw, Poland, in 2017.
