General

GA Airspace Fighting Fund. General Aviation including gliding is facing an unprecedented threat from the growth of restricted airspace. We need to work ever closer together within GA to push back against unreasonable demands for airspace. Although much of the work is carried out by volunteers, inevitably there can be significant costs. A trust fund is being put together by trustees to receive donations. GDPR. The EU's General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) comes into force during May 2018. We are advised that the GDPR aims to give people more control over how their personal data is used, and to give businesses a simpler, clearer legal environment in which to operate by making data protection law identical throughout the single market. BGA Development Officer Alison Randle is developing guidance for clubs. EASA Pilot Licensing. Pilots of EASA aeroplanes are reminded of the requirement to hold an EASA licence by 8 April 2018. Aeroplane pilot licence conversion is completed through the CAA. Tug pilots who convert are reminded to include sailplane towing as a licence privilege.

The CAA has been advised that a European Commission amendment to the Aircrew Regulation to extend the opt-out for sailplane pilots to 2020, which was agreed by the EASA Committee in 2017 and was meant to come in force through the amendment for 8 April 18, will not be published until June 18. Without some action by the UK CAA, pilots of EASA sailplanes who do not hold an SPL or LAPL(S) would find themselves unable to fly EASA sailplanes during the gap between 8 April 18 and June 18. Which is an unacceptable situation that is entirely outside the control of those pilots.

CAA has confirmed that it intends to publish exemptions to permit pilots of EASA sailplanes (which include powered sailplanes, including TMGs) to continue to operate under national arrangements beyond 8 April 18. Such an exemption is issued on behalf of the State via the DfT. CAA have stated that these will be published in time for the 8 April 18.

As you would imagine, the BGA is taking a very close interest in the detail and is in regular contact with the CAA. As soon as we hear more about this dynamic situation, we will advise pilots through the usual channels including their clubs.

Safety

Safe Winch Launching. Cartwheeling accidents happen as a result of not releasing the cable if the wing drops during the ground run. If a pilot cannot keep the wings level before take-off, release before the wing touches the ground. Wing tip holders must STOP THE LAUNCH if there is an up or down force at the tip. Infringements. Each year, the UK experiences a large number of infringements of its widespread and complex areas of controlled and restricted airspace. All are unacceptable. The CAA prosecutes pilots for infringing, which can result in fines or worse. Please make sure you are aware of your responsibilities as a pilot and how to avoid infringements. Trial Lessons / Introductory Flights. A trial lesson is a paid-for first or early instructional flight. An introductory flight is a paid-for gliding experience flight. Clubs and pilots must minimise risk during introductory flights and trial lessons as well as during any passenger flying. Airspace

Oxford Airport and RAF Brize Norton Airspace Change Consultations. As previously reported, Oxford and Brize Norton have published their individual airspace change proposals. There is no doubt that these two, disproportionate airspace change proposals pose a very significant threat to the viability of gliding and other recreational aviation in and through the area and will significantly increase risk for the majority of airspace users operating outside of the proposed airspace. The consultations close at 5pm on 5th April 2018. Non-transponder areas above FL100. The exemption to permit gliders and SLMGs from a requirement to use secondary surveillance radar transponders at and above FL 100 up to FL 195 in designated areas has been reissued as ORS4 No.1258. Pilots intending to use the exemption must ensure that they fully understand the published details. http://publicapps.caa.co.uk/docs/33/1258.pdf
